Evernote is an easy-to-use, free app that lets you take notes, capture photos, create to-do lists, and record voice reminders. The app is **FREE** and may be downloaded from the [iTunes App Store](#) for iOS devices, [Google Play](#) for Android devices, and [Blackberry App World](#) for Blackberry devices.



Notability is another popular note-taking app that integrates handwriting, PDF annotation, typing, recording, and organizing. Notability also includes an auto-sync feature that automatically uploads your note to a cloud service such as Dropbox, Google Drive, or webDAV. The app is available for **\$2.99** and may be downloaded from the [iTunes App Store](#).



Adobe Reader's integrated thumbnail navigation and bookmarks make it easy to find specific pages while highlighting, strikethrough and underlining features allow you to emphasize the core objectives. A freehand drawing tool allows for easy markups and you can add text as well as leave comments with sticky notes. The app is **FREE** and may be downloaded from the [iTunes App Store](#) and [Google Play](#).

If you do a lot of heavy lifting with PDF documents (e.g. annotating, organizing, and syncing to cloud storage) you might consider **GoodReader** (\$4.99 iTunes), **iAnnotate** (\$9.99 iTunes, free Google Play), or **PDF Expert** (\$9.99 iTunes). 	<p>WestlawNext provides many of the features familiar to Westlaw users including WestSearch™, KeyCite™, Folders, History, document notes, highlighting and more -- all redesigned for the iPad. The app is FREE and may be downloaded from the iTunes App Store for iOS devices, Google Play for Android devices, and Blackberry App World for Blackberry devices. WestlawNext account required.</p>
	<p>Lexis Advance™ for iPad utilizes a natural search algorithm and intuitive mobile interface specifically designed for the iPad. The app is FREE and may be downloaded from the iTunes App Store, Google Play, and Blackberry App World. Lexis Advance account required.</p>
	<p>Fastcase is a free legal research application, putting the American law library in the palm of your hand. Fastcase contains cases and statutes from all 50 states and from the federal government. You can search by citation, keyword (in Boolean or natural language), or browse statute collections. The app is FREE and may be downloaded from the iTunes App Store and Google Play.</p>
	<p>The 2013 California Law app enables users to search and browse all California statutes from their mobile devices. Features include: offline access, full-text search capability, search term highlighting, and bookmarking for later reference. The app is available for \$29.99 and may be downloaded from the iTunes App Store (please note that developer Tekk Innovations also sells each code section separately.)</p>
	<p>LawStack is a legal library in your pocket. LawStack comes preloaded with the following: US Constitution, Federal Rules of Civil Procedure, Federal Rules of Appellate Procedure, Federal Rules of Evidence, Federal Rules of Bankruptcy Procedure, and the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure. Additional titles are available for purchase through the in-app store. The app is FREE and may be downloaded from the iTunes App Store.</p>
	<p>dLaw (formerly DroidLaw) is Android's #1 legal reference tool for lawyers, law students and professionals. The app currently allows users to search, bookmark, copy, share, and annotate text of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure, Evidence, Appellate Procedure, Criminal Procedure, and Bankruptcy Procedure on their Droid devices. The app is FREE and may be downloaded from Google Play.</p>



The Law Guide from TheLaw.com provides an 8,500+ word law dictionary and other legal documents, such as the full text of the U.S. Constitution. The app is **FREE** and may be downloaded from the [iTunes App Store](#) and [Google Play](#).



The **Rulebook** provides users mobile access to federal and state court rules. Among the features offered in Rulebook: fulltext searching of the user's Rulebook library), basic annotation tools, and hyperlink to other relevant rules.
